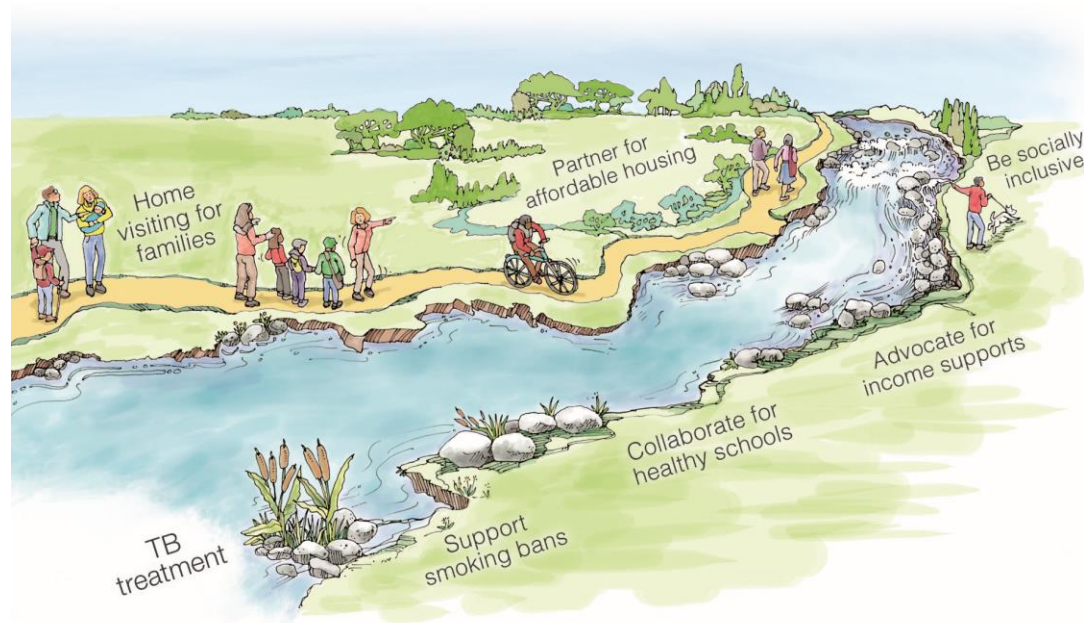

The conditions in which you live, learn, work and age affect your health. Social determinants such as these can influence your lifelong health and well-being.

HOUSING 	POVERTY 
HEALTHY FOOD 6.5 million children live in low-income neighborhoods that are more than a mile from a supermarket. 	INCARCERATION The incarceration rate in the U.S. grew by more than 220% between 1980 and 2014, though crime rates have fallen.

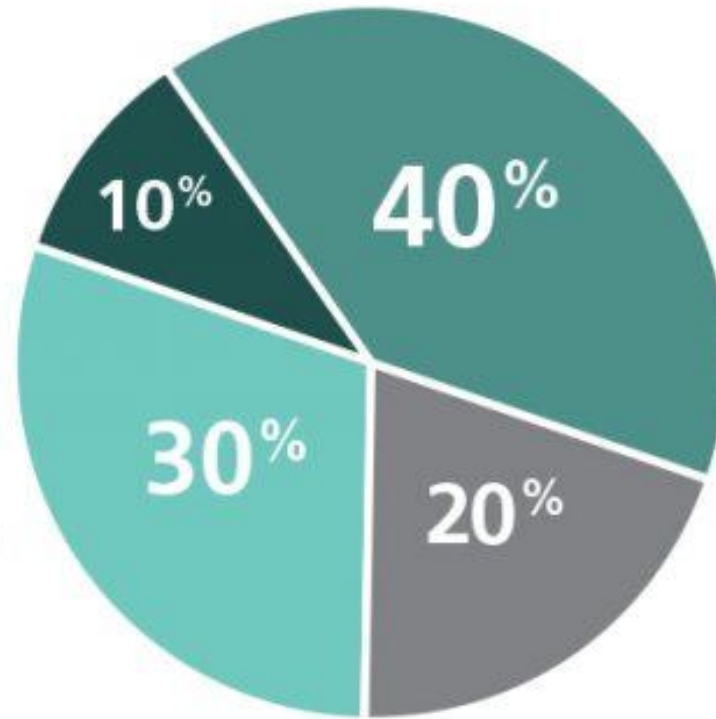
